

## Protect Yourself - COVID-19 Scams

- With the delta variant on the rise, scammers will try to bait you through phishing. They will email you links with bogus "COVID-19 information" Read carefully before opening hyperlinks and messages from an unknown source.
- Government agencies will not try to contact you through Facebook or other social media platforms.
- There are many scams about "secret" coronavirus vaccines or cures. A scammer might ask for your credit card number to send you a vaccine the government has been hiding. Consult your doctor before trying any treatments or cures.
- Many employers now require proof of vaccination. Your vaccination card contains private information hackers will try to get ahold of. Be extra cautious of who you show your information to.
- Scammers are using the Child Tax Credit to contact individuals who qualify, asking to verify information. The IRS will not contact individuals directly regarding a tax obligation via phone, email, or social media.
